The Latin III Summer Assignment is divided into four segments, each of which has its own due date. This way, most assignments will have been submitted and approved by the first day of the school year, *Wednesday, August 28, 2024.*

Submission Guidelines

Each of the requirements must be typed and submitted to Ms. Murphy via CANVAS (<https://stjohnschs.instructure.com/enroll/GHXX98>. Alternatively, they can sign up at <https://stjohnschs.instructure.com/register> and use the following join code: **GHXX98**). The assignments must be sent before midnight on the assigned day. If you encounter any problems with Canvas, you must email me at imurphy@stjohnschs.org before the deadline.

Project Guidelines

Your Emperors Project is designed to give you a fuller understanding of the history of Ancient Rome, and additionally will familiarize you with the reign of a particular historic character. This knowledge will complement our study of Latin prose and poetry from both the republican and imperial periods in our Latin III course. You *must* do the following:

Part I. Bibliography. You must refer to the “Emperors Assignments” section below, where you will find which emperor you have been assigned to study. Research your emperor by visiting local libraries and using journal articles from GALE and/or JSTOR. A good place to start is with the *Oxford Classical Dictionary* entry on your emperor, which will be sent electronically to each student.

Restrictions. You will need to have AT LEAST THREE secondary sources, and ONE primary source in your bibliography. These sources MUST BE PROPERLY CITED in MLA Format.

There is a requirement for ONE primary source, so I suggest you look at Suetonius’ *Lives of the Caesars* if you have been assigned a Julio-Claudian emperor, one of the four emperors who ruled in 69 AD, or a Flavian emperor. Tacitus and Cassius Dio are also historians, whose works would be helpful. If your emperor is an author, be sure to cite their major work(s).

NOTA BENE! Information from websites such as Wikipedia, About.com, etc. DO NOT count as legitimate sources. I want you to go to a library and do research. You may have only ONE online secondary source and it must be from a ‘.edu’ site. Journal articles from GALE and/or JSTOR are an exception to this rule.

“Augustus ruled for more than forty-five years. He came to power when Rome most needed a steady ruler, and he provided stability. By the time of his death, Romans had not fought with other Romans since 31 B.C., the borders were secure, and through the *pax Augusta*, the empire was prospering. All these accomplishments and more Augustus recorded in his *Rēs Gestae* (*Accomplishments*), an account of his life’s work, written in his simple and direct style. The Romans had lost some political liberties, but in return they received peace, stability, and responsible government. It is not a gross exaggeration to call his rule the Golden Age of Rome. At his funeral an eagle was released into the air from beneath his funeral pyre, to symbolize the ascent of his spirit into heaven. He was afterward deified.”

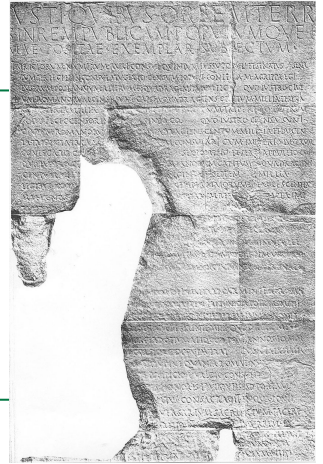


Figure 1: *Rēs Gestae* Divī Augustī

You you must write in the 1st person about your *Rēs Gestae* (Accomplishments), or *Scelera et Flagitia* (Crimes & Sins).

Items you must include in your Adobe Spark Page are:

- (A) New Latin vocabulary words associated with your emperor
- (B) A map that gives important locations associated with your emperor
- (C) Ten historical facts concerning your emperor. (Dates of life/reign – Circumstances of death – Important relatives – Physical attributes – Highlights of career)
- (D) Any famous texts or public works your emperor was responsible for commissioning
- (E) Additional visual elements **and** hyperlinks (e.g., a painting, drawing, picture of a sculpture, TED-Ed video, etc.)—I encourage you to summon these images, media, and links from the internet!

All students must submit their Adobe Spark Page to Ms. Murphy via Canvas (Join Code: **GHXX98**) **by 11:59pm on Monday, August 26, 2024!**

Part III. Script Outline. All students must submit an outline of their script for their presentation speech via Canvas (Join Code: **GHXX98**) to Ms. Murphy **by 11:59pm on Wednesday, August 28, 2024.** Be sure to include explanations of all elements in your Adobe Spark Page! Also, remember **to use the 1st person**, since you will be delivering your presentation *in personā imperatoris* (as if you truly are the emperor you’ve been assigned)!

Part IV. The Presentation. Each student will present *Rēs Gestae* (Accomplishments), or *Scelera et Flagitia* (Crimes & Sins) they have researched on their emperors **in the 1st person** in a **FIVE MINUTE PRESENTATION** from August 29th through September 6th, when we return after summer break. We will begin the presentations chronologically, *ergo* Augustus (i.e., RJ) will be first up!

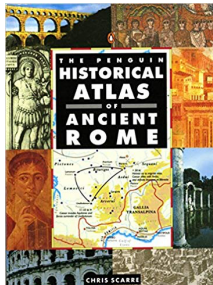
